




## **Malipura Dam**




The story revolves around a family of a 10 years old girl named Bhoori who gets her first period, and her mother, the only female in the house, not being home. Knowing nothing about it, she


YAAN –Is a film about Sukhram and his family, a poor family, living in a small secluded hut near a small town somewhere in the interior of India.

The Unjust and Beyond Dir : Ratheesh Mon Panampatta; 22.43 min; Documentary; India





Tam-brahm Cooking Dir : Sraiyanti, Prem Akkattoos; 9 min 20 sec; Short fiction; India




A man who works as a security guard in an apartment complex goes about his day, while the residents who live there express their views on caste, identity and their own social standing. But actions speak louder than words.


Dir: Yi Wu; 01:10:10; Ethiopia; Documentary
